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AFTER-SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Bucknall Campus: K-5

All students who attend The Harker School may participate in the after-school enrichment and supervision program at no extra charge.

All students will have the opportunity to choose from several activity categories:

- Free play is available to all students after school. Students are supervised by BEST staff in grade-level areas.
- **Drop-In Activities** do not require registration, and are included in tuition. Options include both passive and active activities, and are announced after school. Students may choose to drop in to these activities between 3:45-4:45 p.m.
- **Learning Workshop Classes** require quarterly registration, and are included in tuition. Students must make a commitment to attend for the entire quarter. These classes may vary each quarter depending on availability, and have included fun options such as Storytelling, and Where in the World.
- **Specialty Classes**, such as karate, science and instrumentals, require registration and an additional fee. These engaging classes are taught by outside organizations from our local community. Please note that these class fees will be billed to your Harker account. If your child opts to drop a specialty class, you must do so prior to the second class meeting to avoid charges being made to student accounts. Otherwise, full payment is expected. When dropping a class, written notice to the BEST department is required by emailing LSBESTReg@harker.org.
- Students may mix and match activities from any category as long as the class schedules do not conflict. Please read the following pages for a complete listing of all scheduled after-school opportunities.

DROP-IN ACTIVITIES

ART

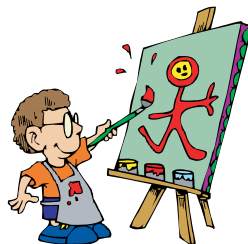
Grades: 1-5

Art is one of the most popular activities offered in the after school program and NO SIGN-UP is necessary for our students here at Bucknall. Drop-in

is limited, so be sure to save some time to drop by the virtual art room!

Materials for drop-in art will be posted the week prior to class, so students can be prepared.



ENRICHMENT ACTIVITIES

Grades: K, 1-3 and 4-5

Join in on a wide variety of active and passive activities implemented by our imaginative and energetic BEST staff. Choose to get up and get moving, or to relax, create and reflect. If feeling active, students can learn the value of good sportsmanship, teamwork and cooperation. On a more passive afternoon, students can opt to let their creativity flow with projects like making crafts, blowing bubbles, molding clay or playing board games. New activities are offered each day and are designed to be age-appropriate for each grade level area. These activities are the perfect way to have fun with friends, stay engaged and participate fully in after-school on a drop-in basis.

STUDY AREAS

Grades: 1-5

Want to get a head start on your homework? Have a test you want to start studying for? Well this is the place for you! A quiet classroom or table area is designated for grades 1-3, the library is available for grades 3-5, and a 10th period classroom is open for grades 4-5.

LEARNING WORKSHOPS (See pg. 17 for Performing Arts)

The following choices are enrichment activities designed to augment classroom instruction in specific subject areas. These workshops require registration and attendance is monitored.

- Students enrolling must make a commitment to attend class for the entire quarter and parents must notify the BEST department if they wish their student to be dropped from the class.
- Classes meet one day per week for either 45 minutes, one hour, or one hour and 15 minutes.
- Learning Workshops are filled on a first-come, first-served basis, so make sure to go online to register during our registration timeframe. The following are the offerings this quarter.
- May require a material fee.

ART

Grades: 1-5

For those students who love to be creative, art is for you! We offer several arts genres throughout the year, such as drawing, painting, sculpting and more. Students will be able to explore a variety of art tools and media in an environment where they can express themselves creatively and joyfully. They are encouraged to explore, create and achieve through process-based projects. The students will also have opportunities for free-choice art work to practice newly learned techniques. Art students will gain and enhance their artistic skills, stimulate their imagination, and build their self-confidence.

FUTURE PROBLEM SOLVERS (FPS)

(Q1 & Q2 Only.) *Be aware participants will be involved with the program the whole year. Weekly after-school meetings are through Q2.

Grade: 5

FPS (motto: "Teaching students how to think, not what to think.") is an international organization teaching and developing critical thinking skills. There is a significant writing and social component because students are expected to clearly articulate their ideas and work together as a fixed team of four throughout the year as they learn to develop and break down any issue or topic. Teams research each topic and then assess a hypothetical future crisis. Assessments include extensive explanations of challenges, solutions and a detailed plan of putting a winning solution into action. In the spring there is also an innovative skit component where students also creatively show their plan in action. FPS develops a multitude of skills including team building, creative thinking and leadership.

Please note: *This is only for the serious student. If you think you may drop at a later date, this class is not for you! FPS requires a yearlong commitment: Q1 & Q2 in an after-school training and Q3 and Q4, even after the initial weekly after-school training ends, and at mandatory weekend training sessions spread out across October, December, February and April (specific dates are not set yet). If a member of a team is missing it is unfair to the other members of that particular team. Teams will be partnered with their own mentor from the upper school to help them improve their understanding of this amazing, but intense, process. (The program starts at the lower school, but actually runs through 12th grade.) There will also be a required parent meeting at the start of the year to explain the program, its benefits, and expectations of all participants.*

JUNIOR BEST

Grades: 3-5

This class is designed for students who are interested in learning to be leaders and mentors to other students. Every class will involve a short lesson and a fun training exercise run by a BEST staffer. They will learn how to supervise the playground, how to resolve conflicts, how to locate students on campus, and even how to plan and run their own enrichment activities. In doing so, they will hone their observation, organization, communication, and problem-solving skills. Plus, walkie-talkies!

STORYTELLING

Grades: K-2

Read stories, work on projects and have fun! Storytelling is a class that provides students the opportunities to acquire and demonstrate their reading skills in a creative way. This class will reinforce language arts skills, such as speaking, listening, reading and writing, along with some time for arts and crafts.



WHERE IN THE WORLD

Grades: K, 1-2

This class provides students with an engaging introduction to world geography and global travel. Each week, we will have the opportunity to explore a different country as a class, paying particular attention to a nation's cultural practices, traditional foods, style of dress, languages and more. Students will take part in interactive lessons and crafts pertaining to each week's subject, and will earn a stamp in their class passport for every country they "visit."

BRICKTECH

Brick Techniques STEM basics with LEGO®

Grade: Kindergarten

Join Brick Tech as we introduce your child to STEM basics by building guided projects out of LEGO® pieces! Each LEGO® project will showcase relevant STEM concepts, such as a motorized helicopter to discuss gear drives or a skyscraper with bricks to introduce overlapping construction, fostering hands-on learning for participants. One project will be introduced each day of class and students will have the remaining time to build, discover, and learn with additional LEGO® pieces. Come explore the basics of STEM this fall with Brick Tech! There are no prerequisites for this class.

Advanced Brick Techniques STEM with LEGO®

Grades: 1-2

Calling all LEGO® builders! Join us in this new advanced LEGO® building class where participants will learn engineering principals with hands-on projects. Each day students will be introduced to a new project that showcases a STEM concept. Using motors to power projects participants will get the opportunity to bring their creations to life, and advance their LEGO® building techniques. From gear cars to conveyer belts students will get a chance to make everything that moves.

LEGO® Robotics with the Spike Prime System

Grade: 3

Brick Tech is happy to introduce our newest robotics class using LEGO's Spike Prime® system. In this course, students will build projects that will introduce robotics concepts while also learning to program with a scratch based programming language. Projects will include use of color, distance and touch sensors. There are no prerequisites for this class.



BAY AREA CHESS

Grades: K-5

Chess (Beginners through Advanced)

Chess has proven to be an invaluable educational aide and teaches children analytical skills that are applicable to many other intellectual pursuits. At

Harker, chess revolves around player development and training while teaching essential life skills such as sportsmanship, learning from mistakes, and growing as a community.

The courses are by skill level, though assessments will be done by our staff on the first session, so registration is handled equally. Mid-year advancement is expected, so a child may be moved or upgraded to a better learning group at any time as players grow in skill. Each skill level will be split into subgroups to keep a low ratio and to optimize learning potential. BAC will provide homework, track all performance and have an end-term championship.

Level 1 – Absolute Beginner: 0 rating, Completely new to the game. Topics can include: piece names/movement, starting position, turn sequence, piece values, special rules, general board competencies and checks/checkmates. Players are not in this section very long as they will be merged with Level 2 once they can confidently complete a game without assistance.

Level 2 – Beginner: Can play to a checkmate, but has fewer than two semesters of chess and under 400 rating (USCF). Topics can include: checkmating patterns, opening principles, the art of drawing, introduction to notation, early tactics and traps, the strategy of positional play, “best-move” puzzles, common “f-pawn” positions, and beginner end-game theories/conditions. Kids who do not play/practice on their own time may spend longer in this level than those who practice regularly.

Level 3 – Intermediate: Children with two or more semesters of learning, possibly some tournament experience, and up to 900 rating (USCF). This skill group incorporates most returning students and covers a huge array of intermediate+ topics at coach discretion (by roster).

Level 4 – Advanced: 900+ rating (USCF). Students will have to have already been in advanced classes in prior seasons, moved up from our Intermediate group, or have an applicable rating already. These lessons prioritize game-analysis, positional play and tournament preparation. Intermediate and advanced players will represent Harker at the many BAC state and national tournaments throughout the year!

KIDS CREATIVE ADVENTURES

Comic Book and Character Design

Grades: K-5

This class is designed for the new or returning student interested in the style of Japanese anime, character and/or comic book design. This class is taught by professional cartoonists and illustrators. We begin each class with warm-up drawing exercises, such as how to draw hands, facial expressions, backgrounds, etc. Each class then concentrates on a different lesson, such as character introduction, story lines, comic covers and lettering. Students work at an independent pace to create their own characters that may be incorporated into their own comic book, if they like. Class fees include all art supplies, handouts, notebooks, plastic card pages, color copying and lamination of all character cards, and special drawing surprises!

Paper Engineering: Castle Construction

Grades: K-5

Create your own castle using recycled materials! Make a working drawbridge and a marshmallow catapult. Students may choose to decorate their castles for Halloween by using glow-in-the-dark spider webs and other creepy delights. Bring imagination to life while designing and constructing your castle!

Time Machine Detectives: The Mystery of the Missing Dinosaur Eggs

Grades: K-5

Mad scientist Dr. Slime has gone back in time and taken 10 T-Rex dinosaur eggs. He has hidden them around the world and throughout time. Your mission, should you choose to accept it, is to build a time machine and travel back in time and find the eggs ... before they hatch! Use your detective skills each week to unravel clues that will direct you to your next destination in time.

EnActe ARTS

Critical Thinking & Creative Writing (Beginner)

Grades: 2-5, meets two times per week

Our popular program is designed for either elementary or middle schoolers. A typical day begins with a screening of a short animated film (3-8 minutes), then delves into story analysis and design in order to help students think critically to creatively write a story using the same logical/narrative structures. Each class ends with each student having an outline for a clearly communicated coherent narrative. This program helps students learn the invaluable skill of clear and persuasive communication from a basis of storytelling. Ultimately, students will have the structures necessary to make

arguments, change minds, and impact the future. FINAL PROJECT: Students will walk away with a portfolio of story outlines they have brainstormed during their time in the class. Video: <https://youtu.be/ALdvq7K9W3A>

Improv

Grades: 4-5

Our new Improv class is designed to help students shake up their minds and bodies. The use of improvisation helps with students' ability to problem-solve, create positive solutions, and work within teams to build upon ideas. While the benefits to learning improv are endless, the most important thing is that students have a blast!

Leadership for Future Innovators

Grades: 2-5, meets two times per week

Is your child going to change the world? This class will give your student the opportunity to think about big ideas in a way they can digest and communicate their own big ideas to shape the future. Each class the student will watch a short TedTalk given by someone between the ages of 6-15 and engage in a critical analysis of the ideas presented within their cohort. Then students innovate their own new projects and share their ideas with their peers. This process will challenge their ideas and ultimately teach them about persuasion, public speaking, charisma, stage presence, clarity, and other leadership skills! Students will have a blast while learning fundamental skills that will help them in their future careers. FINAL PROJECT: Students will write, perform, and record their own TedTalks which can be shared with their friends and family! Video: https://youtu.be/rZFwT_Xrokq

No Fear, Drama is Here!

Grades: 2-5

Our classic theater and film acting class provides an immersive, collaborative and educational experience. Students will have custom scenes written for them by a professional writer, each working on their specific challenges and framed around their personal needs. They will learn projection through vocality, critical thinking through script analysis, creativity through character dimensionalization, command through stage/screen presence, and confidence through emotional exploration. Through all of these tools, students will find a new way of communicating and succeeding with the world around them. Team Building through Story!

Grades: K-1

Our introduction to performance through classic storytelling provides a safe space for students to explore their imaginations and emotions through theater games and performance. Students will work collaboratively in an ensemble performance-based retelling of a storybook, under the guidance of a professional storyteller. They will learn how to work as a team, become stewards of their community, how to project their voices, communicate with their body and exercise critical thinking skills through story analysis and game play. Through all of these tools, students will find a new way of communicating and succeeding with the world around them.

Voice Acting for Animation (Beginner)

Grades: 1-3

In this course, students will develop a character through physicality and vocality, learning empathy, immersion and articulation. Then, they will be recorded virtually in sync with a pre-animated piece, and their voices dubbed (using ADR - automated dialogue replacement) onto the clip. This class teaches them the process of animation (providing a general overview of the technology) and sound recording, and aids in performance as well. GYMKIDS USA

Grades: K-5

Cheerleading: Cheer Kids

Come be a part of the Harker Junior Cheerleaders group! Cheer is a tradition at the lower school, and a fun after-school class. Learn to shake your sparkly pom poms and show your Harker Eagles spirit! Beginning cheer lessons focus on proper technique, cheer positions, cheer jumps, Eagle chants and cheers. Fun pom-pom drill team dance routines will be taught to popular, age-appropriate music. Seasonal cheers and chants for sports and beginning gymnastics will be introduced. Cheerleading and gymnastic skills are taught based on readiness, physical ability and age-appropriateness of each student. Basic cheer positions, warm-up routine and beginning cartwheels are also taught. Mini stunts will be introduced to grade 2-5 students. Lessons are taught outdoors. Taught by Ms. Melinda, Owner GymKids USA. Performing: ALL cheerleaders perform on the last day of every quarter during the after-school meeting for students. K-5 cheer students will cheer at on-campus Harker games when they fall on a cheerleading class day. Grade 2-5 cheer students will also perform at the Harker Homecoming football game in the fall, which is optional and not required for the cheer class.

CHEERLEADER PARENT NOTES: One time pom pom fee of \$35, which includes a custom Harker Cheer bag. Students will be given pom poms in class which will be charged to your Harker account. Returning students: please bring your pom poms to class. Waiver required: Parents/guardians must complete and sign a GymKids USA waiver before class begins. Waivers are to be completed and filled out only once per school year. Waiver form will be provided through a welcome email and handed out on the first day of class. Attire and shoes: Wear comfortable, movable clothing. School uniforms are acceptable with pants or shorts under jumpers. Please wear proper ankle support athletic tennis shoes. Hair: Pull hair back with a ponytail on cheerleading day. Students need to safely see where they are going and landing while practicing cartwheels and basic tumbling.

Rhythmic Gymnastics

Come join the fun and learn to twirl the long ribbon while learning some unique routines! Beginning rhythmic gymnastics and gymnastic movement will be taught. Students will learn gymnastic movement routines and circus style tricks with the long ribbon, hoop, ball and rope apparatuses. Elements of creative movement and gymnastic dance will be introduced. Students will be provided with their own ribbon, ball, hoop and rope during the class. Gymnastic skills are taught based on readiness, physical ability and age-appropriateness of each student. Basic gymnastic positions, warm-up routine, beginning cartwheels and tumbling are also taught. A fun gymnastic obstacle course with cones, hoops, river rocks, jump over bars and balance beam will be included in every lesson to enhance learning. Lessons are taught outdoors. Taught by Ms. Melinda, Owner GymKids USA. K and grade 1 students will be introduced to the long ribbon, short ribbon and hoop apparatus. Grade 2-5 students will be introduced to the long ribbon, hoop, ball and rope apparatus. Grade 2-5 students perform on the last day of every quarter during the after-school meeting for students.

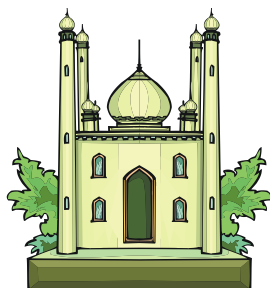
GYMNASTICS PARENT NOTES Waiver required: Parents/guardians must complete and sign a GymKids USA waiver before class begins. Waivers are to be completed and filled out only once per school year. MBK LANGUAGE CENTER

Grades: K-5

Hindi

Students enrolled in the Hindi program with MBK Language Center will be immersed in Hindi language and Indian culture in class. Parents are encouraged to create opportunities for their children that will enhance their language skills at home.



Hindi 1A

Grades: K-1

Prerequisites: None

Students will be immersed in Hindi language through Hindi poems, Bollywood songs and fun stories. With a focus on conversational Hindi, students will be introduced to 200+ vocabulary words, basic script and conversational sentences through scenarios like tasting fruits and vegetables, preparing simple food (roti, raita, neembu pani), virtual trip to a zoo and simple projects around Indian festivals. **Students are expected to make a commitment for a full year.**

Hindi 1

Grades: 2-5

Prerequisites: None

Students in this group will develop appreciation for the Indian culture and Hindi language through simple projects for Indian festivals, Hindi poems, Bollywood songs and fun stories. They will learn to read, write and converse in Hindi and express their likes and dislikes through simple projects like tasting fruits and vegetables, making chaat, neembu paani, roti, raita etc. Students will be introduced to 300+ vocabulary words and basic sentences for asking questions and responding to simple questions. **Full year commitment is required.**

LET'S MOD

Game Design, AI, Computational Thinking, and Web3

Grades: 3-5

Game Design, AI, Computational Thinking, and Web3 is a hands-on class focusing on students' growth mindset for both left and right brains.

Students will enjoy bringing their own stories to life by creating immersive 3D games and sharing them with each other and their families. The class focuses on two parallel paths that empower each other: 1) Computational thinking foundations built based on students coding in math with modern

applications like AI. 2) Design thinking to turn their ideas and stories into engaging games. No prerequisites. Students at different skill levels get their personalized learning path and are challenged to thrive.

KYOSHIN-RYU KARATE

Karate

Grades: K-5

Karate is open to all students, from those with no previous training to black belts. Students will learn and hone basic karate kihon (fundamental blocks, stances, strikes and kicks), self-defense tactics and techniques they can use to defend themselves. They will also learn leadership skills and methods for defusing or avoiding the threat of violence, reducing the chances they will ever become a victim. Karate has long proven effective in helping shy children gain greater self-confidence and those with control issues gain greater self-discipline. In addition, Karate offers many wonderful life-enhancing, life-enriching benefits that include getting into great shape, toning muscles, increasing speed and balance, and cardiovascular health and fitness. Students will also learn the traditional karate kata (forms) and other requirements for advancement in rank. Rank exams will be held each quarter. Those with prior training may wear the belts they earned elsewhere.

This class began at Harker 28 years ago under the direction of Jim Mather (Hanshi), 9th degree black belt, Stanford M.A. and Ph.D. candidate in education. He has taught his 3rd degree black belt grandson Alden Mather (Sensei), who now teaches the classes at Harker. Additional information about CKA can be found at www.ckakarate.com/.

WHIZARA

Mobile App Development

Grades: 4-5

This course introduces students to MIT App Inventor. Students understand the purpose and the user interface of App Inventor, and use it to build several applications/games. As students build these projects, they explore core programming concepts and the different aspects of App Inventor, including adding components and design their layouts, the blocks editor, and writing scripts to add behavior to the components. No prior experience with coding is required to participate in this course. Device prerequisite: (i) Laptop/Computer (Windows or Mac) and Phone/Tablet (Android/Apple) or emulator in case there's no access to Phone/Tablet OR (ii) HYPERLINK "<https://appinventor.mit.edu/support/chromebooks>" Android capable Chromebook). Scratch Junior Programming

Grades: K-2

Whizara's Scratch Junior programming course offers a fun way for young students to learn programming fundamentals as they explore and develop imaginative stories, animations and games using MIT's Scratch Junior drag and drop visual programming interface. Students learn programming concepts and Scratch Junior specific concepts including motion, looks, sound, loops, events and get creative with designing, drawing, recording and storyboarding personalized projects. The course further reinforces computational concepts of sequencing, pattern recognition, parallelism and algorithmic thinking. Scratch Programming

Grade: 2-3

Whizara's Scratch programming course offers a fun way for young students to start thinking like a programmer as they explore and develop imaginative stories, animations and games using MIT's Scratch programming interface. Students learn programming concepts and Scratch specific concepts including motion, looks, sound, events, loops, conditionals, game mechanics, operators and variables. The course further reinforces computational concepts of sequencing, pattern recognition, parallelism and algorithmic thinking. No prior coding experience is required to participate in this course. A Tablet, Chromebook or any computer/PC with internet connectivity is required to join the course.

Python Programming

Grades: 4-5

Whizara's Introduction to Python Programming course introduces students to the fundamentals of syntax-based programming via its fun, graphics, animation, and game-based engaging curriculum. Students learn the fundamental programming concepts including variables, user inputs/output, random, conditionals, loops, functions, events, list and more. The course further reinforces computational concepts of sequencing, pattern recognition, parallelism and algorithmic thinking, and software development process. No prior coding experience is required to participate in this course. A Chromebook or any computer/PC with internet connectivity is required to join the course.

SCIENCE MADE FUN

Grades: K-3

HIGH TOUCH HIGH TECH

Science Made Fun programs provide an opportunity to expose children, at an early age, to the amazing world of science and nature, through a discovery-style learning and inquiry-based dialogue with a real scientist. In this hands-on science class, students will explore various topics among chemistry, physical, life and earth sciences. Each week the students will discover a new and engaging scientific concept, which will be accompanied by two or three hands-on experiments which bring the concept to life. Students roll up their sleeves and become REAL scientists! *Note: The same concepts will be covered in both classes. For the upper grade levels, we will increase the depth of explanation and time permitting, may include an extra experiment. Different topics will be covered each quarter, so students can sign up year-long to explore across the scientific disciplines. Most concepts covered will be the same year-over-year.*

Topics covered in Q1: 'Sense'-ational Science, Color Fun, Fantastic Static, Magnet Makers, Jurassic Jr., Matter Matters, Chem Fun, Fun'omena

In this session, students will learn about primary and secondary colors, states of matter and about our five senses. We'll make fossils, explore magnetism and static electricity, and learn about several natural weather phenomena.

YOGA

Grades: K-5

YOGA6 INSTRUCTOR

Yoga is part of a holistic education! Through connection to movement and each other, children can learn complex concepts, such as belonging in the universe, self-regulation and self-love, while also having fun! Yoga poses, breathing exercises, activities and games help promote the physical, emotional and social development of children. CHORAL MUSIC

Grades 4-5 Lower School Concert Choir

Material fee: \$30

Lower School Concert Choir is a yearlong performance-based ensemble for students who are passionate about singing and eager to improve their musicianship skills in a group setting. Students will develop their vocal technique and tone during weekly rehearsals while learning challenging repertoire in a variety of musical styles.

Members of Lower School Concert Choir have many opportunities to perform. Annual performance events include the K-12 holiday assembly, United Voices concert, and the winter and spring lower school music concerts. Lower School Concert Choir gives students the skills they need to continue their musical pursuit in middle school.

Grades 1-5 Dance/Grade Level Dance Classes

Students must take after-school grade level dance ALL YEAR to be eligible to perform in the dance concert. The annual dance concert is May 25, 26 and 27. There is a \$90 production fee to be in the dance concert, but no cost to take dance. New students are encouraged to try dance, so they don't miss out on being in the show. Grade 4-5 students can do both after-school sports and dance. This class will teach students the fundamentals of dance. Jazz and ballet skills form the basis for the center floor warm-up. Dance offers students the opportunity to explore movement, be creative, move to music and have a great time! Quarter 1, 2 and 3 after-school dance classes will focus on reviewing dance skills, learning new dance steps and working on dance technique. Quarter 4 students will be taught a routine for the grade 1-5 dance concert with emphasis on learning how to perform and perfect their moves. A \$1 per minute late charge will be posted on the student’s account for extended care.

DISMISSAL INFORMATION
